




Annual Report FY23

July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023







As we approach our 35th anniversary in 2024, we look back upon the last five years with amazement and a deep sense of fulfillment at what the CMC accomplishments have meant for our community and the people we welcome through our doors each day.

That we outgrew our former space and home of 27 years is a bit of an understatement. Fortunately, our board and staff were forward thinking back in 2015 and had begun the challenging work to envision and prepare for our future home. Launching a Capital Campaign months prior to a pandemic at times felt insurmountable, but as usual, our community stepped up to let us know that the CMC mission is needed and our services have an impact.

We moved into our newly renovated building with great excitement of what was to come, never imagining that 4 weeks later our roof would blow off and damage our beautiful new space. As with most challenges came blessings and we held on to those to lift us from the disappointment that our dreams would be on hold for another several months.

Yet, we never stopped serving our community; providing temporary housing to refugees following the derecho, ensuring that people had access to food, shifting our services to address the health concerns of non-native English speakers during COVID, and shifting to online English instruction kept us focused on what was most important.

Education Services FY23


After increasing class offerings and introducing additional group classes and drop-in English classes both online and in-person, Education Services reached 530 active students attending classes in-person or online in English as a Second Language, U.S. citizenship, digital literacy, and basic math — the highest number of students served in CMC's

STUDY AREAS



Our new building has opened up opportunities we could only dream about in the past.

- CMC Kids provides dedicated space for children to be cared for while their parents access classes and other services.
- The new Women's Day Center provides refuge for women who are literally homeless.
- Welcoming seven additional women into our safe and supportive housing environments.
- Eliminating our student waiting list by providing additional group classes, online learning, and more space for tutors and students.
- Welcoming 250 Afghans in three months, finding housing, employment and support services as they began to rebuild their lives in Iowa.

These are just a few examples of how our new Place of Welcome at 1220 5th Avenue SE has allowed us to better meet the needs of more people. As we take a minute to breathe and embrace our blessings, we want to welcome YOU to come visit and help us keep the momentum going into 2024.



Refugee & Immigrant Services FY23

Following years of record-low refugee admissions to the country, the past two years have brought unprecedented urgency within Refugee & Immigrant Services. Resettlement agencies like CMC had to quickly rebuild capacity for one of the largest and most expedited U.S. resettlements to date. In just a few short months, CMC welcomed more than 400 arrivals in FY22, and 355 arrivals in FY23 — a significant increase compared to 35 arrivals in FY21. Along with resettlement services, refugees and immigrants have access to employment support and individualized case management to connect to resources and services throughout the community.

- Over 1,010 individuals accessed one or more of our multiple services throughout CMC, including case management, education, employment, resource navigation, healthcare navigation, business training, and more.

Women's Services FY23

For women healing from trauma and searching for stability, Women's Services provides an emotionally safe and empowering community that allows women to work toward their goals. Women have access to safe housing, supportive services, therapeutic and skill-building groups, and individual case management. Day Center services were added in 2022, offering unhoused women in the community a safe place to go to meet basic needs, build practical skills, form connections, and get support connecting to community resources and securing safe housing.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING PROGRAM

- 34 women served
- 3,944 days of housing provided
- Average Length of Stay: 116 days

SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROGRAM

- 7 women served
- 1,634 days of housing provided
- Average Length of Stay: 597 days

Supplemental Services FY23

In addition to the core services CMC provides, our Supplemental Services department facilitates in-kind donations, manages our food pantry and community garden, and works with our Service Area programs to enrich the lives of students, clients, and residents.

COMMUNITY GARDEN

- Added 800 sq. feet of garden space
- 4,492 sq. feet of gardening space available
- 12 raised beds for Women's Services
- 10 residents participated in gardening groups
- 7 ground plots for Education students
- 11 student growers participated
- 1 ground plot for food pantry and the LIFE program

EMPLOYMENT & CAREERS

• 316 individuals received employment case management and job training

Refugee Child Care Business Development Program

Since its inception in 2019:

• 48 refugees completed the training to open in-home licensed child care businesses

• 30 licensed child care homes established

• 128 child care slots created including first, second and some overnight shifts

REFUGEE SOCIAL SERVICES

- 313 individuals received resource navigation and case management
- 90 clients enrolled in WIC and SNAP benefits
- 61 refugee and immigrant students grades 6-11 participated in the afterschool and summer LIFE program (Learning Is For Everyone)



WOMEN'S DAY CENTER

- 27 women accessed drop-in services
- 15 women connected to housing
- 3 women entered into the Transitional Housing Program

AFTERCARE & ALUMNI SERVICES

• 7 women received aftercare case management for up to 6 months after graduating Transitional or Supporting Housing

- 340 group sessions provided
- 152 therapeutic sessions
- 188 Skill-building sessions

Volunteer Support FY23

We finally had our first "normal" year since fiscal year 2019! Tutors have returned to pre-pandemic levels and the introduction of new volunteersupported programs like LIFE, CMC Kids, and Community Sponsorship are helping CMC offer a wider array of services for clients while conserving resources.

TUTORS

361 tutors provided

10,513 hours of instruction

LIFE VOLUNTEERS

• 33 volunteers provided 430 hours of support for the LIFE program (teaching, leading activities, and transportation)

CMC KIDS VOLUNTEERS

• 17 volunteers provided 170 **hours** of play and supervision for children while their parents studied unencumbered.

GARDEN VOLUNTEERS

• 27 volunteers spent 58 hours supporting CMC's Community Garden, creating a welcoming space where clients can grow their own food.

RIS VOLUNTEERS

• 97 volunteers contributed 2,085 hours towards Refugee & Immigrant Services programming and support, including the LIFE program.








Financials

CMC has seen between 12% and 36% increase in revenue and expense each of the last five years. Operational costs provide for the CMC programs and services, while also receiving and distributing funds to clients. In alignment with the large increase in resettlement the last couple of years, the pass-through funding has significantly increased.


